

The Power of **BOLD**

In 1869, eight **BOLD** women raised their own money to send a woman doctor and a woman teacher to India ultimately creating a hospital and school that exists to today. These women created a movement of women who discovered that they could raise funds, manage administrative details, train, and deploy missionaries to foreign lands. Remember, these women had limited financial resources of their own.

The creation of early missionary societies meant opportunities for **BOLD** women to be in service through the church as never before possible. As they worked to alleviate suffering and acquire legal status for women and children in the United States and in numerous other countries, they soon discovered that they were being denied the rights to full participation in church structures and on mission boards where policy decisions were being made. By continually being **BOLD**, women were granted laity rights, inclusion in general conferences and finally full clergy rights in 1956.

In 1942 The First Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild was moved from St. Louis, Missouri to Columbus, Ohio where a **BOLD** racially integrated group could be housed in the same hotel.

1952 The first Charter of Racial Polices was adopted by the Woman's Division. **BOLD** women persisted and in 1964 the General Conference adopted the Charter.

BOLD women still have work to do. In the next four years, **BOLD** women will learn about and advocate for:

- Maternal and Child Health
- Economic Inequality
- Climate Justice
- Criminalization of People of Color-Mass Incarceration

As we approach the end of our awards year, make sure your unit is on track in support of our work in the world through the 5 Channels of Giving:



Greetings Sisters,

Although United Methodist Women National Office has four priorities for this quadrennial year our focus in North Georgia is **Economic Inequality** therefore, I will continue to lead with this focus in mind.

Many of us who were at Assembly participated in a public rally on the steps of the Ohio state capitol. This action was to bring attention to one of the many issues and peoples impacted by economic inequality. The posters here are some of the ones used during the rally.

From the United Methodist Book of Discipline: As a church, we are called to support the poor and challenge the rich ... Poverty most often has systemic causes, and therefore we do not hold poor people morally responsible for their economic state. (Social Principles, ¶ 163 E)

We need to fight for those who are not in a position to fight for themselves. Economic inequality is a direct link to poverty which in turn is associated with many of the societal ills we face today. When there is lack of sufficient income, people don't have access to healthy food choices, many don't have access to affordable housing, many cannot properly clothe themselves or seek adequate medical attention. These challenges in turn are a major link to poor maternal and child health, homelessness, criminalization and so on!

What can you do?

- Participate in Mission Studies; the 2018 study What About Our Money? A Faith Response may be of interest
- Be attentive to news reports and legislative actions around economic inequality

Hygiene Kit Value: \$12.00 per kit

Hygiene Kit Materials

- 1 Hand towel
 - o 15 x25 inches to 17 x 27 inches
 - o Kitchen, cleaning, and microfiber towels not acceptable
- 1 Washcloth
- 1 Toothbrush
 - Adult size only
 - Do not remove from original packaging
- 6 Adhesive bandages
 - o 3/4 inch to 1 inch-size
 - Common household Band-Aids
- 1 Bath-size soap
 - o 3 oz. and larger sizes only
 - No Ivory or Jergens soap due to moisture content
 - o Do not remove from original packaging
- 1 Comb
 - Comb needs to be sturdy and longer than 6 inches long
 - o No pocket combs or picks, please
 - Rattail combs and combs without handle are acceptable with a minimum of 6 inches of teeth
- 1 Metal nail file or nail clippers
 - o No emery boards, please
- 1 plastic bag
 - o One-gallon size sealable bag only
- \$1.00 to purchase toothpaste

Assembly Directions

Set the \$1.00 for toothpaste aside to be included in a separate envelope. Lay out the hand towel flat on a table. Lay the washcloth flat in the center of the hand towel. Place all remaining items on top of the washcloth. Fold over the sides of the hand towel to cover all of the items. Fold over one end of the hand towel so that it covers all of the items. Grasp the bundle of items tightly and roll over the remainder of the hand towel tightly. Place the tightly rolled bundle in the plastic bag. Remove as much air as possible and seal the bag.

Important Notice

- All items must be new.
- Do not wash any of the items as they will be considered used.
- Please remove all packaging, unless otherwise specified above.
- All emergency kits are carefully planned to make them usable in the greatest number of situations. Due to the
 fact that strict rules often govern product entry into international countries, it is important that kits contain only
 the request items-NOTHING MORE.
- DO NOT include any personal notes, money, or additional material in the kits. These things must be painstakingly removed and will delay the shipment.
- UMCOR is now purchasing toothpaste in bulk to be added to health kits before shipping to ensure that the
 product does not expire before they are sent. Do not put single dollar bills in each kit. Collect all monies
 for toothpaste and shipping place it in a separate envelope and send along with the kit donations.

Packing and Shipping Kits Instructions

- Box weight: Each packed box cannot exceed 66 pounds.
- Complete 2 packing lists: One for your records and one to put on the shipping box.
- Paste the shipping label / packing list on the outside of each box you send. The shipping list helps the depot to quickly process kits.
- Processing & Shipping Costs: Please enclose an envelope containing at least \$1 for each kit you send. This
 donation enables kits to be sent to areas in need.

In Luke 4:18 ("The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed.").

This scriptural verse serves both as a model and a mandate for Christian social action and advocacy. These words led us to choose the following priority issues for 2016-2020: criminalization of communities of color and mass incarceration, economic inequality, climate justice, and maternal and child health. Whether we vote or not affects all of these issues. Therefore, the social action coordinators of the Atlanta College Park District made a decision to become a partner with the Atlanta NAACP to register as many persons as possible (placing emphasis on voter registration for high school juniors and seniors). This project was started on April 24, 2018, when Lydia Arnold, our social action coordinator on the district level called for a meeting of the unit social action coordinators. To date, we have registered 104 persons by meeting each Tuesday for five hours in selected high schools within our district. Now, that school has closed, we will prepare to finish this project in October of 2018.

The following churches were represented by the elected social action coordinator of the United Methodist Women or a representative from the local unit: *Warren UMC* – Beverly Starks and Celestine Jones; Cliftondale UMC - Maryella Montgomery; Bethel UMC - Patricia Smith; Cascade UMC - Gloria Hardnet, Dot Boler, Daisy McDowell, and Lydia Arnold.

Our goal is to include the social action coordinator or a representative from each unit or church in the North Georgia Conference. You will be hearing from me very soon. I hope you will make every effort to attend the next meeting.



Let us continue to work through Christian social action and advocacy to bring about a change.

She spoke of her dreams being dashed by Civil war in her country, but she gained strength from other women in the same situation, but who had a much positive outlook at life. Her drive was Faith in God, her community- help young people realize their dream; Impact-no longer play church, Jesus Action person. The scripture focus was on Mary mother of Jesus. Excellent music, and dramas, heard from various groups with inspirational and Bold messages; excellent workshops and Town Hall meetings. Griffin executive team takes mission trip

In early April the Griffin District United Methodist Women's executive team enjoyed a time of fellowship and ministry when we made a three-day trip to work in the United Methodist Disaster Response Warehouse in Decatur, AL.

The warehouse is operated by the North Alabama Conference of the UMC. It is one of seven warehouses utilized by the United Methodist Committee on Relief in its international relief work but the warehouse also operates a variety of ministries on its own.



United Methodist Women in North Georgia are probably most familiar with its Christmas Shoe Box ministry. Many of our units over the past several years have packed shoe boxes filled with toys and articles of clothing which are given to children in developing countries at Christmas by

United Methodist missionaries. The Christmas Shoe Box ministry originated with the warehouse but it is just one of the many components of its work. Relief supplies are stored there and then dispersed to affected communities when a disaster occurs. While the Griffin UMW group was there, for example, strong storms hit Decatur and Ray Crump, manager of the warehouse, and others were out the next day assessing damage and how the warehouse could help.



Our team worked assembling cleaning buckets and tornado buckets. The cleaning buckets have long been a staple of UMCOR outreach to help in clean-up after a disaster, particularly a water-related disaster. They contain such items as laundry detergent, household cleaner, sponges, a brush, disinfectant soap, gloves, trash bags and insect repellent.

While the cleaning buckets are great for water damage, an additional set of needs often exists after a tornado. Thus the warehouse volunteers invented the tornado bucket, which has nails, a hammer, a flashlight and safety glasses in addition to

several different sizes of plastic bags, a roll of toilet paper and some feminine hygiene products.

The warehouse has a section for "community supplies," where people and agencies in the community can come and select what they need from the supplies that are there. Another warehouse ministry is providing "Angel Boxes" - baby caskets -- which are handmade in four sizes for parents whose infants have died and who do not have the resources to buy a casket.

Two international ministries include shipments of medical supplies and bed linens. In 2016, the warehouse worked with the CDC to provide bedding items to the countries in West Africa - primarily Sierra Leone, Liberia and Guinea -



during a horrific outbreak of the Ebola virus The virus is so contagious that bed linens had to be burned after they were used and the Decatur warehouse sent three shipments to help with the constant need for new bedding supplies.

I shall pass this way but once. Therefore, any good that I can do, any kindness that I can show, let me do it now, for I shall not pass this way again.

The warehouse - which got its start in 2006 after Hurricane Katrina - is totally operated by volunteers, many of whom are retired. They are definitely a testimony to the fact there is no retirement from God's work!

Ray Crump, manager of the warehouse, said, "Our motto is, *'if it's in the warehouse, it's not doing anybody any good. Let's get it out where it will do some good.''* Doesn't that sound like the Great Commission in Matthew 28: 18-20?


