



Have You Thought About Your 2019 Budget?

Have you thought about your 2019 budget? Not your personal budget (although that would be good too), but your UMW Unit's Budget? Your unit should have a budget – a spending plan. And your spending plan should reflect the goals and purpose of your unit. For United Methodist Women, that means that your money goes toward mission focusing on women

and children who may not have their own voice in the world.

The local unit's budget consists of three main categories:

- ◆ Pledge to Mission (60%) It is recommended that 60% of all funds be sent to the district treasurer as pledge to mission. These dollars are spent supporting programs in the United States and around the world that benefit women, children and youth thereby impacting entire communities. As an agency of The United Methodist Church, United Methodist Women abides by the social principles and discipline as determined by General Conference, giving only to projects in accordance with those guidelines.
 - ♦ Did you know that you as United Methodist Women OWN properties like Murphy-Harpst?
- Administration and Membership Development (10%) Items that enrich the educational experiences and leadership capabilities of unit members and that are necessary for the unit's functioning.
 - dependent care for meetings
 - postage and printing
 - ♦ program materials
 - ♦ program expenses
 - ♦ scholarships and expense help for members to attend Mission U, conference and district meetings, ecumenical mission programs, and other items relating to United Methodist Women
- Mission Locally (30%) This budget category that enables the local unit to be in mission in its own area -- such as your local woman's shelter, food pantry, or other appropriate community service.
 - ♦ Money raised and contributed by United Methodist Women is raised for the purpose of mission. The parsonage and the church kitchen are the responsibility of the church Trustees.

Think of the remittance form as a spending plan, or budget, for the 60% Pledge to Mission. The first section, Mission Giving or The Five Channels, are undesignated funds that will travel around the US and the world supporting the missions and projects of United Methodist Women. If you want to be a 5 Star Unit, look at how you might want to divide your pledge to accomplish that.

Then take a look at the Supplemental Giving section. These are additional special projects that you can support through UMW. Some of these are recommended by UMW National but four of them are recommended by North Georgia UMW because they are located in our geographic boundaries. Two are properties that you own, New Bethlehem Community Center and Murphy-Harpst. The other two are Historically Black Colleges and Universities that have long Methodist roots. All four deserve a little extra attention from us. I strongly encourage your unit to give to our four conference mission projects.

I dare say that our 5 Star and 5 Star Plus units do have a spending plan that intentionally insures that they become a 5 Star Unit.

PLANNING FOR MISSION

Plan for mission events and other programs in advance.

- ⇒ Consider whom you might ask to join you in this work, such as other United Methodist Women and other faith-based groups or community organizations.
- ⇒ Reach out and invite them to join your group in the project or program.
- ⇒ Publicize your event using the church newsletter, website, social media, etc.

VALUING OUR MISSISION

Take time to honor what you accomplish together.

- ⇒ Plan at least one program each year in which you look back and honor or celebrate what you have accomplished.
- ⇒ Honor the organization's leaders and members contributions. Consider honoring them with Special Mission Recognition pin.
- ⇒ Remember to evaluate what you do well and what you can improve upon.

BULIDING COMMUNITY

United Methodist Women is a supportive community that builds, expands and strengthens relationships by inviting others to participate in your work and mission.

- ⇒ Explore local or district groups in churches nearby.
- ⇒ Send invitations to program and events held or sponsored by your group.
- ⇒ Attend programs or events held in your area or sponsored by groups in nearby churches or congregations.
- ⇒ Respond to invitations sent to your organizations as well.

BEING IN MISSION: GROWING SPIRITUALLY

Growing spiritually helps us to better understand how we can be a part of God's mission in the world.

- ⇒ Organize the spiritual growth study and develop "what it means for us" list as a result.
- ⇒ Use resources in United Methodist Women's Bible to help the group see more deeply into the biblical text.

BEING IN MISSION: SERVING AND ADVOCATING

Act on your belief by participating in ministries of service and advocacy.

- ⇒ Sign up to receive Action Alerts to stay informed.
- ⇒ Partner with the National Missions Institutions or community organizations or community organizations where you can volunteer.
- \Rightarrow Engage in district and conference opportunities.

BEING IN MISSION: EDUCATING FOR CHANGE

Learn about mission and how you can be part of it in new ways.

⇒ Take advantage of opportunities through United Methodist Women such as Mission u, the Seminar Program, Reading Program, response magazine and also first-time attendees.

As we continue Christ's mission in ministry, let's share our stories and use the activities in the program book to move you to action in mission with women, children and youth.

During this time of Thanksgiving, I give thanks for you and for your commitment to bring relief and restoration to our sisters, brothers, children and youth in the United States and around the world.

I give thanks for your response to the **Living Wage for All Campaign**. More than 5,000 postcards were gathered at a variety of events over the past several months encouraging Wendy's to come on board with other major corporations and improve the wages and working conditions of farm workers. Quoting a press release from the United Methodist Women's website, "We've already helped farm workers in the field have a voice and be able to work with dignity,".... "We've been able to achieve just wages to support our families, and we've done this working shoulder to shoulder next to United Methodist Women." Early on, I pointed you to Micah 6:8 by asking, "What does the Lord require of you?" Micah 6 involves an imaginary conversation between the Lord and Israel. In verses 1-5 the Lord introduces His case against the disobedient people of Israel. Verses 6-7 record Israel's response as a series of questions beginning with, "With what shall I come to the Lord?"  - ♦ After each event when the Sampler Box has been ordered the books may be distributed to those who want them, free of charge.
- Question 3: If it can be used for other than Annual Meetings, how many times can you order it?
 - ♦ We are hoping that the Sampler Box , which was tested and piloted at annual meetings. may be something that folks will want to use going forward. It may be ordered for any meeting.
- Question 4: Is there a cost for this box?
 - ♦ It is free of charge.

Everyone has the potential to discover a human trafficking situation. While the victims may sometimes be kept behind locked doors, they are often hidden right in front of us at, for example, construction sites, restaurants, elder care centers, nail salons, agricultural fields, and hotels. Traffickers' use of coercion – such as threats of deportation and harm to the victim or their family members – is so powerful that even if you reach out to victims, they may be too fearful to accept your help. Knowing indicators of human trafficking and some follow up questions will help you act on your gut feeling that something is wrong and report it.



Human Trafficking Indicators

While not an exhaustive list, these are some key red flags that could alert you to a potential trafficking situation that should be reported:

- Living with employer
- Poor living conditions
- Multiple people in cramped space
- Inability to speak to individual alone
- Answers appear to be scripted and rehearsed
- Employer is holding identity documents
- Signs of physical abuse
- Submissive or fearful
- Unpaid or paid very little

Questions to Ask

Assuming you have the opportunity to speak with a potential victim privately and without jeopardizing the victim's safety because the trafficker is watching, here are some sample questions to ask to follow up on the red flags you became alert to:

- Can you leave your job if you want to?
- Can you come and go as you please?
- Have you been hurt or threatened if you tried to leave?
- Has your family been threatened?
- Do you live with your employer?
- Where do you sleep and eat?
- Are you in debt to your employer?
- Do you have your passport/identification? Who has it?

Where to Get Help

If you believe you have identified someone still in the trafficking situation, alert law enforcement immediately at the numbers provided below. It may be unsafe to attempt to rescue a trafficking victim. You have no way of knowing how the trafficker may react and retaliate against the victim and you. If, however, you identify a victim who has escaped the trafficking situation, there are a number of organizations to whom the victim could be referred for help with shelter, medical care, legal assistance, and other critical services. In this case, call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center.

911 Emergency

For urgent situations, notify local law enforcement immediately by calling 911. You may also want to alert the National Human Trafficking Resource Center described below so that they can ensure response by law enforcement officials knowledgeable about human trafficking.

Call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center, a national 24-hour, toll-free, multilingual anti-trafficking hot-line. Call 1-888-3737-888 to report a tip; connect with anti-trafficking services in your area; or request training and technical assistance, general information, or specific anti-trafficking resources. The Center is equipped to handle calls from all regions of the United States from a wide range of callers including, but not limited to: potential trafficking victims, community members, law enforcement, medical professionals, legal professionals, service providers, researchers, students, and policymakers.


