

Honoring Our Foremothers' Legacy

On March 23, 1869, in Boston, Massachusetts, Clementina Butler and Lois Parker informed six women members of the Methodist Episcopal Church about the desperate healthcare and educational needs of women in India. Their Call to Action raised funds to send Isabella Thoburn, a teacher, and Clara Swain, a doctor, to India. The meeting in March led to the formation of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the first of many Methodist women's mission organizations, to address the injustices imposed on women and girls in the 19th century. United Methodist Women is their successor, and this year we celebrate **150 years** of changing the lives of women, children and youth.

Together, We Make an Impact

Today, we lead the way in combating human trafficking, promoting fair food practices, interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline and working for living wages. Organized for mission, United Methodist Women operate from a biblically based understanding that equips laywomen to grow in their faith through prayer, study, fellowship and action, and to work for social justice to promote a more equitable, safe and healthy world for women, children and youth. This is what distinguishes United Methodist Women from other organizations, and attests to its longevity and relevance, today and especially in the years to come.

Building a Legacy

Our work is not done. By building a strong core endowment, United Methodist Women will secure long-term stability, while allowing us to continue vital programming that fulfills our mission. One of the beauties of an endowment is that it keeps benefitting an organization in perpetuity.

Five Channels of Mission Giving.....

Through their generosity United Methodist Women members help empower and improve the lives of women, youth and children in the United States and around the world.

About 70 percent of Mission Giving funds from members go to programs and projects supporting women, children and youth. Around 20-30 percent stays with the local, district, and conference organizations of United Methodist Women for local mission. Only 9 percent covers administrative costs.

Pledge to Mission

An individual member's Pledge to Mission is the amount a woman gives to her local unit to help fulfill the Purpose of United Methodist Women.

The conference United Methodist Women pledges a specific amount to United Methodist Women's national office for mission with women, children and youth and retains a designated percent to be used for district and conference administration and membership development expenses.

World Thank Offering

Spontaneous additional gifts can be given out of gratitude for God's abundance and in celebration of the joys of life.

The World Thank Offering is an opportunity for individuals to respond to God's abundance and grace with spontaneous gifts of gratitude. The funds collected are used in the total program of mission carried on through United Methodist Women's national office in the United States and around the world.

Special Mission Recognition Pins and Certificates

These pins offer a meaningful way to honor members who have dedicated so much time and effort to service. Gift amounts range from \$40 to \$2,000. Pins are purchased through a treasurer.


Gift in Memory



We could not have done this work without you. Please keep in mind that trafficking continues after the Super Bowl is over. It does not magically go away just because there's not a big event going on; trafficking is prevalent 365 days a year. It is on all of us to continue the fight. Remain vigilant and attentive; continue to send tips to police and the trafficking hotline. Don't let it be on us to lose a child... **See Something-Say Something-Do Something!** Find more at the NGUMW website, http://ngumw.org.

Dear God, give me ears to hear, eyes to see and a heart that obeys!

We must also remember our priority to become **INTERRUPTERS of the School to Prison Pipeline**. The school-to-prison pipeline is a term used to describe how children and youth of color are rerouted by systems and institutions; funneled away from educational success and towards the criminal justice system.

Did you know that Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration is a Racial Justice issue? The Racial Justice Symbol represents United Methodist Women's commitment to work for racial justice. It symbolizes a world of racially and ethnically diverse peoples working together side by side to create a world in which every person has a voice, rights and opportunity for abundant life. Within the image are two hands joined together to work for justice for all God's children.

Dear God, give me ears to hear, eyes to see and a heart that obeys! Let me be discerning of your command to serve and courageous enough to become an interrupter for the sake of your children. Amen!








United Methodist Women Connection



Previous years, the National Organization of United Methodist Women has sponsored an event to "Intercept the Trafficker," in each city where the Super Bowl takes place. In as much as Super Bowl LIII took place in Atlanta, Georgia on February 3, 2019, the event was hosted by the North Georgia Conference United Methodist Women. Jessica Godfrey, North Georgia Conference United Methodist Women Social Actions Coordinator chaired this event. The theme, "Running Out the Clock on Human Trafficking" was used. The two-day event was held on January 25-26, 2019 at Hoosier Memorial United Methodist Church. Approximately 200- 250 persons from various churches around the conference were in attendance as well as representatives from the South Georgia Conference. Over 250 persons attended the tailgating event on Friday evening followed by an in-

spiring worship service. Over 200 persons were in attendance for the speakers on Saturday followed by distribution of flyers and signage identifying and/or reporting human traffickers.

School Kit Assembly & Shipping Instructions

School Kit Materials (School Kit Value: \$11 per kit)

- \Rightarrow One pair blunt scissors
 - ♦ Round tip only
 - ♦ No plastic scissors
- \Rightarrow One box of 24 crayons
 - ♦ Only 24-count boxes are accepted
- ⇒ Three one-subject notebooks
 - ♦ No marble composition books
 - ♦ No 3 or 5-subject notebooks
- ⇒ One pack of loose-leaf paper
 - ♦ 100-200 page packets are acceptable
 - ♦ Wide or college rule accepted
- ⇒ One hand-held pencil sharpener
 - ♦ 1-inch or longer
 - ♦ Remove from packaging
- **⇒** One ruler
 - ♦ 12 inches or 30 centimeters long
 - ♦ Sturdy or flexible material accepted
- \Rightarrow Six unsharpened pencils
- ⇒ One eraser
 - ♦ Two inches or larger
- ⇒ One two-gallon re-sealable plastic bag

Assembly Directions

- ⇒ Stack all paper items on top of each other.
- ⇒ Place all loose items on top of paper. (Small loose items may be placed in a smaller re-sealable bag.)
- ⇒ Place kit inside of re-sealable bag and seal.

Important Notes

- ⇒ Homemade or purchased cloth tote bags are no longer being accepted.
- \Rightarrow All items must be new.
- ⇒ Please do not include any personal notes, money or additional materials in the kits.
- ⇒ Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols.

Packing Instructions

- ⇒ Packed box should not exceed 70 pounds.
- ⇒ School kit item can be packaged inside of the large plastic re-sealable bag.
- ⇒ Complete two packing lists, one for the box and one for your records.
- ⇒ Attach the shipping label/packing list on the outside of each box.
- ⇒ Please send a check for the total number of school kits times \$1 per kit for the cost of shipping to Sager Brown. One check may be written for the entire donation.


