



This year's Mission u was a truly unique and unforgettable experience. The event, held at Fayetteville First United Methodist Church, transformed all in attendance through study, Christian fellowship, and worship.

Our theme this year was Radical Discipleship: Then and Now. Inspired by our foremother's mission to India over a century and a half ago to address the injustices placed on women and girls. Mission u participants were tasked with the same ideology to see, believe, and be present in order to help those in need today. We had three studies for 2019, *Practicing Resurrection: The Gospel of Mark and Radical Discipleship, Women United for Change: 150 years in Mission*, and *What About Our Money? A Faith Response*. Our study leaders are amazing and travel every year for training and bring these awesome studies and deliver them with excellence to all of us at Mission u.

The two-day event started out with praise and worship, and allowed us to spend time catching up with our friends from other churches and districts that we haven't seen in a while, and share time together. On Friday evening we took a trip down memory lane with 23 United Methodist Women who traveled to the Red Bird Missionary Institution in Beverly, KY. We viewed pictures and shared stories of our adventures doing what we could to assist the community; painting homes, cleaning up the school, participating in arts & crafts with the children, and celebrating how we we're truly blessed to be a blessing. The group also learned what sisterhood is really about with 23 of us all in the same cabin together for a week. Our downtime was spent sharing devotionals, food, laughter, and just having real family time together. We also had a dynamic trio from, Holy Disruption, a cohort of young women leaders, share what they are doing in our communities, meeting with other women, sharing and studying the book *Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools* by Monique Morris. The book will be implemented as part of Mission u's curriculum next year.

We all have a mission story. Lessons shared at Mission u will carry us through as we continue to honor our foremother's legacy by disrupting and acting on injustices pushed on women, children, youth, and men in our communities.



# Why Leave a Legacy?

I work with children at Zoar UMC and through Mission u. I am seeing a generation of young girls who are going to need United Methodist Women and its PURPOSE as much as I have. I would like to help ensure that they will have a strong organization that will help them grow in faith, become the whole persons they are called to be, be part of a supportive community and encourage their commitment to social action. United Methodist Women has helped me in those areas, and I would like to help make sure that future generations have those same benefits available. I remember the first time I was asked to speak outside my local unit. I was invited to talk to a unit meeting at Covington First UMW about what the PURPOSE meant to me. I was so nervous I didn't sleep the night before and was a nervous wreck as I stood up to speak. But UMW truly is a supportive community and those ladies were so hospitable and gracious. I can't believe that I now look forward to speaking to groups and attribute that change in my attitude to my involvement in United Methodist Women!

I recently had the privilege of hosting Christi Campos, Executive for Development and Donor Relations, at my home. Christi was coming to North Georgia, to visit in the homes of ladies who had expressed an interest in the Legacy Fund, and I had a great time showing her around the state and hearing what UMW had meant in the lives of these women. It was obvious we could not make it to see everyone so I asked if we could have a gathering at my house. A tea was an opportunity to get together with a group of ladies who shared my passion for United Methodist Women. There were a couple ladies I invited who were going to be out of town, but everyone who was able accepted the invitation. It was really a time of fun and fellowship and everyone who attended has shared with me how much they learned. When something has been as transformative in your live as United Methodist Women, you love talking about it and sharing it with others.

A wise former North Georgia UMW President, President of the SEJ Core Planning Group, UMW National Director and lawyer, Doris Paul, used to do financial workshops for our conference. At one work shop I remember her saying, "If your heirs can't get by on 90% of your estate, they can't get by on 100%." My husband and I grew into tithing. We did not even realize that we were tithing until we did our income taxes one year. It has become a way of life for us and we want our estate to reflect the importance that ministry has had in our lives. My portion of our estate tithe will support the ministry that has helped me be the whole person that I think Christ has called me to be as a woman of faith, United Methodist Women. The Legacy Fund is the method that I am using to make this planned gift.

Each one of us has to make up our own mind how we will support UMW. We can support its ministries through out local unit pledge, through the channels of giving and now through our gifts to the Legacy Fund. I hope that generations of young women will experience the opportunities for growth and service that we who have been part of this 150<sup>th</sup>Anniversary Celebration have experienced!

Needed to complete UMCOR kits at Impact:

#### **Hygiene Kits**


- Toenail or fingernail clippers (no emery boards or metal nail files)
- ♦ Adhesive bandages (¾ by 3 inches)
- Common household bandages acceptable

#### **School Kits**

- Hand-held pencil sharpener (1-inch or longer remove from packaging)
- Two-gallon re-sealable plastic bags

#### **Cleaning Buckets**

- One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (three solid, or three gel fresheners also acceptable)
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)
- Pump spray bottles must have protective covers

#### Rome/Carrollton District

The Rome First United Methodist Women met the morning of August 24,2019 for their General Meeting/ Coffee. The speaker for the meeting was Judge Billy Sparks of the Rome-Floyd County Drug Court. This accountability court was started by now retired Judge Tami Colston in 2017. The drug court is an 18 month program aimed at helping

a person with a drug conviction break the cycle of repeated drug convictions and jail time. They will be drug free, have a stable job and have the tools they need to turn their lives around. The person has to be chosen by the Drug Court Team and voluntarily go into the program. They must be nonviolent, not a gang member, not a drug dealer or sex offender. They usually have 3-5 years left of their sentence, but can voluntarily extend their probation time to finish the program. There are 24 people now participating in the 5 phases of the Drug Court program. The person must stay off drugs, have random drug testing, have a curfew, attend group therapy 2x/week and individual therapy, attend AA meetings 2x/week, peer review 2x/month, court every week to meet with the Drug Court team, perform community service, get a job by the beginning of phase 2 and pay \$25/week fee. The surveillance team monitors them at home, work and play. There are rewards for meeting goals, but also sanctions for failing a drug test, being late for court or work, etc. Drug Court is a way to keep nonviolent offenders out of jail----- maybe one solution to interrupt the school to prison pipeline.



The mission project for the General Meeting was to bring money to purchase Wimbledon Cushions for the children at Anna K. Davies Elementary School. These cushions were designed for children with autism so they can sit and focus in class while moving on the "wobble" cushion.

The Atlanta Emory District United Methodist Women held a Social Action event Saturday, August 24, 2019 at Grayson UMC. The Grayson folks did an outstanding job hosting about thirty-five women from twelve different churches in two districts.

Vicki Tyler with NETT Church Works, a 501(c)3 non-profit affiliated with The NETT Church, gave an excellent presentation about the exciting plans in the works for the former John Wesley UMC campus. That site is now the "Nettwork Campus," and in partnership with HomeFirst Gwinnett, an initiative of Gwinnett County, United Way, and Primerica, they will soon be opening the *only* emergency shelter space in Gwinnett Coun-

ty for women and children experiencing homelessness. At this shelter, Gwinnett County will have an assessment center with coordinated entry to all of the services available to help people get back on their feet, including an on-site health clinic and job training programs. This coordinated entry will be a game-changer for people experiencing poverty and homelessness because they will no longer have to go from one non-profit to a government department to a faith-based organization to get different kinds of help: a case manager on site will help ensure each person gets the services and help needed.

Another partnership they're developing at Nettwork Campus is with Proskuneo School of the Arts, an arts-based afterschool program for children. To help with that program getting off the ground, the Atlanta Emory District United Methodist Women collected school and art supplies for the children they'll be serving. You can see in our photo how much we collected. As always, United Methodist Women know how to come together to do something good for women and children!

The purpose of Nettwork Campus is "building community through connection," and they plan to "address the challenges associated with poverty and homelessness" with the ultimate goal of "strengthening the emotional, social, and spiritual vitality" of the Norcross community within a distance of 2.5 miles of the site. Project 2.5 is inspired by Jesus' miracle of using 2 fish and 5 loaves to feed thousands, and the initial plans include creating shared-use spaces and community event space, turning an empty field into a large recreational / green space to be used by the shelter residents and community organizations focused on at-risk children, and providing laundry and shower facilities for area homeless, in addition to the shelter.

#### Human Trafficking: it's massive and it's everywhere

Probably we all know that human trafficking is an enormous problem, but that stark point loomed large once again at the Griffin District United Methodist Women's human trafficking awareness and action event Aug. 17 at Wesley Chapel UMC.

Our speakers, Maja Hasic from Tapestri located in Tucker, and Sabrina Crawford, founder of Gigi's House in Jonesboro, work with two very different groups of trafficked victims. Maja's clientele is the immigrant and refugee community and Sabrina's is teenage victims of sex trafficking from communities right here in Georgia.

"Anyone can be a potential victim of human trafficking," Hasic said. "In the U.S., trafficked individuals come from all over the world, especially from economically depressed countries."

Said Crawford: "It [sex trafficking] is happening in our communities to our kids. ... We have a 10-bedroom home. We have 10 girls at this time and we turn away girls every day." Plans are underway for an expansion of Gigi's House so that more teenagers can be helped.

The Griffin District event was well-attended, with 150 participants, including 16 youth. Some 150 10-dollar gift cards to



Walmart and Target were donated to aid recovering victims at Tapestri, Gigi's House and the Salvation Army' Haven Atlanta. All three organizations expressed gratitude for the gift cards that will greatly benefit those with whom they work. In addition, participants received copies of the state-mandated posters listing trafficking hotline numbers and were asked to help get them displayed in businesses in their communities.

Wesley Chapel United Methodist Women provided superb hospitality for the day, planned an inspiring worship service that included hymns, special music and dance in addition to the speakers, and served an abundant and delicious breakfast. Wesley Chapel pastor, the Rev. Bert Neal, closed the day with a blessing of the gift cards and posters and some remarks about how we as followers of Christ must be willing to assist traumatized victims as they seek healing and wholeness.

Crawford founded Gigi's House for girls aged 13-19 after she became aware of the enormity of teenage trafficking right in our own backyards. Fourteen is the average age of a minor sex trafficking victim,

and 12 the average age of entry into this lifestyle. Most of these teens come from an abusive home life, and many have a history with the child welfare system.

Often they are sold into trafficking by one of their parents or a boyfriend. Just as often they are runaways lured into sex trafficking by manipulative predators who prey upon their insecurities and vulnerabilities and promise them a bright new world and future.

"These traffickers are so smart to know what to say," Crawford said. "They [the girls] are looking for love. They are just looking for it in the wrong places."

Gigi's House is a faith-based program which "I really believe is God's ministry," said Crawford, a member of Community Bible Church in Stockbridge. "Pray for us," she said. "Pray for the girls' lives to be transformed; pray for my team who works with them; and pray for the traffickers."

The home is staffed 24/7 and residents are constantly checked on. In addition to round-the-clock supervision, the teens receive counseling from licensed therapists, medical care, home schooling, mentoring and other help.

In addition to praying for the ministry, there are other helping opportunities, such as mentoring, tutoring, administrative aid and donations of money and gently-used items to a newly-opened retail store. The home's expenses run about \$60,000 per month. and only about three-fourths of this comes from DFCS, which places the girls at Gigi's House when they become wards of the state.

Tapestri works with men and boys, in addition to women, who are victims of sex trafficking, domestic violence or labor trafficking. While sex trafficking seems to receive a higher-profile, there are many labor victims who come to the U.S. expecting a better life only to find them themselves in involuntary servitude in a modern-day form of slavery. These workers are often found in restaurants, hotels and in agricultural settings.

In a workshop, Hasic discussed the posters listing numbers trafficking victims can call for help, which were mandated by Georgia state law in 2013. These posters are required to be displayed in such settings as adult entertainment establishments, bars, airports, bus and rail stations, truck stops, emergency rooms, urgent care centers, farm labor contractors, privately operated job recruitment centers, safety rest areas along the interstates, and hotels.

Each church present at the human trafficking event was given posters and asked to assist in getting them displayed in strategic locations. When approaching a business, Hasic said, ask to speak to the supervisor; make them aware, if they don't already know, of the human trafficking hotline, and ask them to display the poster. Failure to comply can result in a misdemeanor conviction and a fine.

Hotels and health care providers are important places to have these signs posted, since a survey in 2017 indicated that 75 percent of survivors said they had come into contact with hotels and 69 percent into contact with health care professionals at some point in their victimization.

Some victims gather enough courage to escape their captivity on their own and will make their way to a house of worship, Hasic said.

"You really are in a position to help", she said.

# History & Legacy



1869: 8 women

Today: 800,000 members

United Methodist Women inherits the vision and toil of women's missionary societies of eight denominations since 1869. Its 150-year legacy started when the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society first organized in Boston in response to a lack of women's health in India.

Women in the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren traditions organized about the same time in history (1869-1893) when women and children were legally classified as "chattel, legally dead, non-persons." There was little service to women because of prejudice and limitations of cultural attitudes in the church and in society.

Living the Legacy: A Historical Timeline, depicts the continuing journey of women in mission from 1869-2002.

In 1869, Mrs. William Butler and Mrs. Edwin Parker, wives of missionaries to India, were home on furlough. They spoke to a group of eight women in Boston. Mrs. Butler told about the desperate spiritual and physical needs of women in India. A male doctor could not treat women. Schooling for girls was almost non-existent. Single, trained and dedicated women were needed for medical and educational work.

The women who were present called another meeting of women, wrote a constitution, and organized the Methodist Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (WFMS). By November 1869, the newly formed organization raised funds and sent Isabella Thoburn, an educator, and Dr. Clara Swain, a doctor, to India.

Ms. Thoburn began a school with six young girls in Lucknow. This school expanded to include Isabella Thoburn College, the first women's college in Asia. Dr. Swain began her medical work, resulting in the establishment of the first women's hospital in Asia. Both of these institutions are still serving the people of India.

In 1875, Lizzie Hoffman was instrumental in forming the Woman's Missionary Association of the United Brethren Church. After spending one night praying, she was convinced that the women of the church should be organized for special mission work. Sierra Leone, in Africa, was the first country to which missionaries were sent.

Strong Woman's Home Missionary Societies were founded in 1880 (Methodist Episcopal Church) and 1890 (Methodist Episcopal Church, South)

In 1879, the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Protestant Church was founded; and in 1884, the Woman's Missionary Society was organized in the Evangelical Association. These groups became powerful, independent women's organizations, sending hundreds of missionaries all over the world and supporting many projects.

The Ladies Aid Societies, which had existed for many years, were incorporated into the missionary societies in the 1940s. Through reorganization and denominational mergers, these various groups were brought together. In 1973, United Methodist Women became the women's mission organization of The United Methodist Church.

The United Methodist Church General Conference 2012 voted to make United Methodist Women's national policymaking body autonomous. The transition began Oct. 1, 2012. Harriett Jane Olson in her chief executive report at the organization's annual meeting in New York City, October 2013 reported, "Our work is not just about service, it's about worship, it's about standing up, stepping up making our voices heard," she said. "We try to help governments see the world the way we see the world be-
