Mission giving must always come first because it supports all of the current mission and advocacy work United Methodist Women are doing as an organization. The Legacy Fund Endowment is money for the future. Proceeds from the invested funds will endow future core expenses so that even more can be directed to support and grow vital mission work throughout our country and world.

United Methodist Women is here for the long-haul, turning our faith, hope and love into action on behalf of women, children and youth today – and building a foundation for the next 150 years. Let me know, if you need additional information or have questions on the Legacy Fund.

UMCOR Kit — As you know, relief supply kits help provide care for the most vulnerable during times of crisis. The North Georgia Conference United Methodist Women's initiative focus for 2020 is Climate Justices and in keeping with the focus, the 2020 UMCOR kit for Annual Conference is the cleaning kit. We are asking members and supporters to bring supplies to prepare cleaning kits. **Do Not bring assembled kits in buckets because of the limitations to handle at Annual Conference.** Some of the most needed items are: 4-8 oz pump spray air freshener, solid Glade style air freshener are also acceptable, 6-14 pump spray insect repellant, and pump spray bottles with protective covers. 

North Georgia United Methodist Women start new program to raise awareness on Climate Change

⁴¹ Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. ⁴² But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a few cents. ⁴³ Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. ⁴⁴ They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything—all she had to live on." (Mark 12:41-44)

Often, when faced with great challenges, we ask ourselves what can I do? We feel too small to make a contribution that feels significant. As Christians, we have hope instilled in us by our faith which is so wonderfully expressed in Mark 12:41-44. We know everyone must do their part regardless of size. It all counts!

As United Methodist Women, we have been working on Climate Justice for the past quadrennium, but recently the news of global warming has become all to frequent. We all want to do something more and there are plenty actions we can take. That is why this new program **Tabs for Creation** is a small but meaningful step in raising awareness in UMW Units and Circles. The program also provides a way to involve the whole church and engage children in your church.

So what is Tabs for Creation?

It is a new program for UMW to collect aluminum tabs to be recycled. Aluminum tabs use the most aluminum by weight in cans. Plus, they are small and easy to ship. They don't involve the burden of collecting cans which can be messy and dirty. Benefits of participating in the program include: educating our local UMW unit and churches on recycling and other issues, reduce the energy needed to make new aluminum, reduce carbon footprint of mining new aluminum, and help make people aware that recycling is still important despite recent news. In fact, using recycled aluminum reduces 80% of the energy used to create new packaging. That's a huge impact.



Bonus, aluminum tabs are valuable. By collecting tabs we can raise funds for the UMW Climate Change efforts!



So what does it involve?

UMW members start collecting aluminum tabs. Have members bring them to unit or circle meetings. Ask the church if you can set-up a collection container. Children love the hide and seek aspect of finding tabs to collect. So maybe place a container on the Sunday School floor or have them collect each Sunday in Sunday School. Make this a church wide activity. Bring your tabs to a district or conference event or mail them to Beth Bond, Creation Care c/o Decatur First United Methodist Church, 300 E Ponce de Leon Ave, Decatur, GA 30030.

I don't drink soda!

Aluminum tabs are on many more things besides Coke and Beer cans. Aluminum tabs are on soup and other food cans, pet food cans, and tennis ball cans (any tennis players out there?). Anything that has a pull tab is probably made out of aluminum. Collect them all.

We already collect tabs

Some of you may already be doing this for another non-profit. That's great! We are encouraging you to make your efforts bigger. Split the donations by giving half to the non-profit and half to UMW. You'll probably end up donating more to the non-profit because of increased awareness.

I am in a small church

Then take it to your community! Have friends, family members, neighbors and community members drop them off. This gives you a front facing opportunity to interact with your local community. You might even try to get an article in your local newspaper. Plus, for locations that don't have recycling this gives people a way to do their part.

The North Georgia Conference United Methodist Women are excited about this new project that gives you a daily activity to make your contribution to caring for God's creation. Look for more actions that you can take to help do our part towards creation care.



Christmas Around the World

For their December Unit Meeting, the Cumming First United Methodist Women celebrated Women in Mission Around the World. growing and learning together as we participated in one of two studies.






that the two districts will be merging at the North Georgia Conference level, and that means it will affect how we are organized as United Methodist Women, since we have a UMW organization in every district.

National Scholarship 2020

Overview

The National Scholarship is for <u>lay women</u> in the USA who are pursuing careers in church or social service vocations. *Preference will be given to laity working on behalf of women, children and youth.*

Eligibility

- Undergraduate or graduate students of a National Mission Institution College or University (Bennett College, Clark Atlanta University, Huston-Tillotson University, Paine College, Pfeiffer University, Spartanburg College and Rust College).
- Candidates for the Deaconess program (scholarships will support the required classes and other expenses). Deaconesses may also apply for a scholarship for degree program.
- Lay women who has been active in UMW and are pursuing careers in lay ministry or social service work.

General Criteria

- Scholarships may be used for undergraduate, graduate study or student internships in religion or a related field (social work, counseling, etc.) at an accredited college or university.
- Preference given to undergraduate or graduate students of a National Mission Institution College or University (Bennett College, Clark Atlanta University, Huston-Tillotson University, Paine College, Pfeiffer University, Spartanburg College and Rust College).
- Preference given to United Methodist denominational affiliation.
- Preference given to laywomen working on behalf of women, children and youth.
- Preference given to women involved in United Methodist Women
- Applicant must be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States.
- A scholarship is granted for one year. Scholarship recipients may reapply.
- The average scholarship is \$1,000 and will not exceed \$5,000.
- This is a competitive scholarship and not all applications will be funded.

Guidelines for Submission of Application

- The applications are due on or before Tuesday, April 24, 2020 for the fall semester of 2020.

- All applicants will be notified by June 2020.
- Scholarship funds will be sent in time for registration and made payable to the school only.

Theressa Hoover Community Service and Global Citizenship Award

Calling young women who want to travel and study! United Methodist Women is accepting applications for the Theressa Hoover Community Service and Global Citizenship Award. The grant is awarded to a laywoman (between the ages of 21-35) who wishes to travel in order to explore and study in a country or region other than the applicant's own.

Priority will be given to projects that match one of United Methodist Women's four issue priorities for 2016-2020:

- Climate Justice: Advance just energy for all for clean, renewable energy, through a just and
 equitable transition
- Maternal and Child Health: Decrease maternal mortality; develop a network of women's health advocates for access to health care and education
- · Criminalization of Communities of Color: Interrupt the school to prison pipeline
- Economic Justice: Economic inequality and living wages for all

In addition, applicants should demonstrate concern for, and a connection to, their community, as well as a recognition of their global responsibilities.

Applications are due by **Tuesday**, **July 21**, **2020**.

Theressa Hoover

Originally from Arkansas, Theressa Hoover joined the Woman's Division of Christian Service as a field worker in 1948. In 1968 she was elected chief executive of the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church. She was the first African-American woman to hold that position or any comparable post in the denomination. She served as head of the division for 22 years and retired in 1990. Ms. Hoover died at 88 on December 21, 2013 in Fayetteville, Arkansas.

Theressa Hoover leaves behind a legacy: In 2004, *Ebony* magazine named her one of the 100 most influential African-American women, and the Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church in Little Rock, Arkansas, was named for her. In 1990, United Methodist Women created the Theressa Hoover Community Service and Global Citizenship Award. We are grateful to be able to continue Ms. Hoover's passionate work for women and children by passing on the torch of global citizenship with this award.

Honoring Our Foremothers' Legacy

On March 23, 1869, in Boston, Massachusetts, Clementina Butler and Lois Parker informed six women members of the Methodist Episcopal Church about the desperate healthcare and educational needs of women in India. Their Call to Action raised funds to send Isabella Thoburn, a teacher, and Clara Swain, a doctor, to India. The meeting in March led to the formation of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the first of many Methodist women's mission organizations, to address the injustices imposed on women and girls in the 19th century. United Methodist Women is their successor, and we celebrate 150 years of changing the lives of women, children and youth.

Together, We Make an Impact

From the beginning, United Methodist Women members have led the way in countless endeavors, from founding schools, hospitals and clinics in the early 19th century to interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline and working for maternal and child health today. Our membership is comprised of women from all backgrounds and experiences, compelled by their Christian faith to serve in places they never imagined. They are unified in the pursuit of women's progress and their development as leaders in their churches, work settings and communities. Organized for mission, United Methodist Women operate from a biblically based understanding that equips laywomen to grow in their faith through prayer, study, fellowship and action, and to work for social justice to promote a more equitable, safe and healthy world for women, children and youth. This is what distinguishes United Methodist Women from other organizations, and attests to its longevity and relevance, today and especially in the years to come.

Building a Legacy

United Methodist Women members' commitment and faithful service has led our foremothers' vision forward for 150 years. Yet the needs, difficulties and unjust practices faced by women, children and youth continue. These factors underscore the urgency of our work and the importance of a stable and consistent source of revenue that enables United Methodist Women to respond to emerging needs and support the work of future generations of women in the United States and around the world. In 2014, the Legacy Fund Endowment Campaign was launched to raise \$60 million to secure United Methodist Women for service in the next 150 years and beyond.

> is to educate, encourage and empower young women to live out the PURPOSE of our organization and church.




