We now have two Limitless Coordinators who will be working with the young women in our Conference to get them acclimated to United Methodist Women while allowing them to focus on issues that are important to them. One of our coordinators will work with the middle and high schoolers and the other will work with the college age and older women. Our complete calendar is also located on the website and I invite you to participate in any way you can in our events. While we are still socially distancing, we have planned to host most of our events this year in a virtual setting. We have also updated our Mission Today requirements to allow smaller units to participate and we hope these are used as a guideline to help you in your planning

for 2021.

I hope and pray that we can meet together in person before the end of 2021, but everything happens in God's time, not ours, so until we see each other, please stay safe and God bless.



STREET GIRLS



IN LIBERIA No one but the body of christ to care for them

Twelve years ago, the Oak Grove United Methodist Women (UMW) in Decatur, Georgia felt called to respond to then President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf's plea for help for her country. "Where," she asked in an article in *Response* magazine, "Is the body of Christ?" After 14 years of civil wars, the schools had been demolished.



The need for schools was desperate and the Oak Grove UMW voted to raise the money to **build a school** and did. Today the school is educating students in grades K-9 and is fully self sufficient. Oak Grove took several mission teams to Liberia to help build the school and minister to the people.

One of the needs expressed by the Monrovian UMW women was to **build a dormitory** for the street girls so they could be fed, housed and educated. Now, twelve years later, the Monrovian women are asking for help to complete the dormitory (started with the picture to the right) so these precious young women will not have to support themselves by prostitution and drug sales.



Education Not Incarceration: Rejecting the Criminalization of Communities of Color

Note that 2 million people are held in jail, prison and desention in the United States. The Rock of Repositions of The United Methodist Church 2016 oliulion 3179 in other Williams (1997) and the States of Repositions of The United Methodist Church 2016 oliulion 3179 percent and with only 5 percent of the world's population, the United States receives 25 percent of all prisoners in the world."

We are not all feeling the weight equally. The NAACP notes that Africas incarceration rates are more than five times those of white incarcerati incarceration rates are more than five times those of white incarceration rates. Meanwhile, the Autonial Household Survey on Drug Albuse (2000) showed that while "white youth aged 12-17 are more than a third more likely to have sold lilegal drugs. Than African American youth." In other words, white youth are committing more drug crimes than African-American youth but are arrested and incarcerated far less. This is result of the ongoing criminalization of communities of color.





As you get started, your local secretary of program resources should: •

- Help you enroll in the Reading Program.
- Explain the Reading Program's procedures.
- Give you a Reading Program catalog.
- Help you buy or borrow Reading Program books.

The Reading Program Leads to Action

The Reading Program is a study opportunity, but it should also lead to action. Here are a few suggestions to assist you:

- **Pray.** Books often raise concerns about people, countries and issues. Bring these concerns to God during your prayer time at home and at group meetings.
- Host a program. For example, a locally-sponsored program on climate justice could help the church and community explore ways to be better stewards of God's Earth.
- **Organize.** You and your group can contact the Office of Community Action to work on social action plans for your local group and church. To obtain resources for community organizing e-mail Carol Barton at cbarton@unitedmethodistwomen.org.

Action Suggestions

- Encourage youth to read and review titles from the reading lists.
- Continue your actions on the Charter for Racial Justice Policies of The United Methodist Church.
- Promoting the Reading Program in Local & District Groups
- Form an action team to take action on an issue addressed in one or more books.

- Start a reading group of adults and/or children or youth.
- Present book reviews of Reading Program books at United Methodist Women meetings.
- Take Reading Program books and issues of response to retirement and nursing homes and read regularly to residents.
- Inform parents, grandparents and others with children and youth that books for children and youth are available through the Reading Program.
- Let pastors, church leaders and Sunday school teachers know of the books available through the Reading Program.
- Highlight large print and other special format books to include a wider variety of readers.
- Honor those who participate in the Reading Program. Reading Program certificates will be presented to those who complete plans.
- Show special recognition to units or individuals who complete Plans III and IV.
- Develop displays to encourage book sales, especially around holiday seasons.



We look forward to the day that we can meet together in person, but we are all grateful that we can be together virtually!



The Purpose is adopted by the General Conference of The United Methodist Church as the official mission statement of United Methodist Women.
