## All About the Lenten and Easter Season

(Information taken from Various Sources on the Internet)

#### Shrove Tuesday – Tuesday, March 1, 2022

Why is it called Shrove Tuesday? It comes from the word 'shrive', which means to give absolution after hearing confession. So Shrove Tuesday is the day when people went to confession to prepare themselves for Lent, which begins on the following day, Ash Wednesday. So, the day before Lent they rid their homes of fatty foods including eggs, milk, sugar, syrups, and butter. All the ingredients needed to make pancakes. Rather than seeing the foods go to waste, they cooked them into pancakes to celebrate their final day of free eating.

#### Ash Wednesday – Wednesday, March 2, 2022

Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God and marks the beginning of the penitential Lenten season. It is commonly observed with ashes and fasting.

The ashes symbolize both death and repentance. During this period, Christians show repentance and mourning for their sins, because they believe Christ died for their sins. The ashes used on Ash Wednesday come from burning last year's blessed palm branches.

#### Forty Days (not counting Sundays) – March 2 – April 14, 2022

Lent is 40 days long, not including Sundays (that means the season is technically 46 days long). The fact that it's 40 days has significance:

Jesus fasted and prayed for 40 days and spent 40 nights in the desert before He began His public ministry.

#### Palm Sunday – Sunday, April 10, 2022

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday, which commemorates Jesus's triumphant arrival in Jerusalem, where he received palm branches at his feet.

#### Maundy Thursday – Thursday, April 14, 2022 (Last day of Lent)

Maundy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper between Jesus and his disciples. Maundy Thursday is the last day of Lent. The word Maundy comes from the latin, 'mandatum', or 'command' which refers to the instructions Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper. In many countries the day is known as Holy Thursday and is a public holiday. Jesus is believed to have washed the disciples' feet before the meal in order to demonstrate the importance of serving others.

#### Good Friday – Friday, April 15, 2022

Good Friday kicks off the most momentous historical weekend of the year; Good Friday is the reason we have a resurrection Easter celebration. The first records of the term Good Friday come from the 1200s. The good in Good Friday doesn't mean "good" in the typical sense—it means "holy."

Because Christians observe Good Friday as the anniversary of the day that Jesus was crucified and died, it is typically treated as a day for somber reflection. Some people fast for the day or continue the fast they observed throughout Lent. In contrast, Easter is treated as a time of celebration.

#### Easter Sunday and Eastertide – April 17, 2022 plus 50 days

Easter Sunday, also called Resurrection Sunday, is celebrated on April 17th this year. Easter Sunday is the highest holy day of the Christian Year. Eastertide is the period of 50 days, spanning from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday.

#### Why Does Easter fall on a Different Day each Year?

Because Lent always starts exactly 46 days before Easter Sunday, its dates always depend on Easter, which is a floating holiday. So how do we determine Easter? It's got a lot to do with the moon. According to Christian tradition, Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday following the full moon that occurs on or just after the spring equinox (and the Christian Church calendars state that the spring equinox always falls on March 21).

In 2022, the first full Moon after March 21 takes place on April 16, which means Easter falls on the following Sunday, April 17. Subtract 46 days from that and you get the first day of Lent, March 2.

Please note that Orthodox Christians in Europe, Africa and the Middle East celebrate Easter later than most in the western world. It's because they use a different calendar to work out what day Easter should fall on. For these Christians, Easter falls on Sunday, April 24, 2022 this year.

Reading Program books are divided into five categories and are available for people of all ages and reading levels. As you read, track your progress using the Reporting Form. When you submit the Report of Completion Requirements, you will be recognized with a Certificate of Recognition.

Earning your Certificate of Recognition is just one way to show what you've gained from the Reading Program. The Reading Program is not meant to be completed alone or in a vacuum. As you read, consider taking one or more of the following actions:

#### **Track Your Progress**

- **Share the program** with United Methodist Women members and members of the community.
- **Help people attain books.** Distribute this guide.
- Connect with local and district groups. Start a book club, download books onto an e-reader to pass around and share, present book reviews at group meetings.
- **Display a progress chart** in your church for all who wish to participate, and post displays to encourage book sales.
- Pray. Books often raise concerns about people, countries and issues. Bring these concerns to God during your prayer time at home and at group meetings.
- Advocate for tangible change. Many Reading Program books address issues such as climate change, mass incarceration, immigration and racism. Organize a task force to address these issues in your community.

## **About Serving**

## Women in Faith New Possibilities

At the beginning of a new year, we often take a look back at the previous year. During our Annual Meeting in October, you learned that we had found the need to reduce our Pledge to Mission from \$300,000.00 to \$280,000.00. This was necessary due to the effect the Pandemic has had on our units. While we did not meet that goal last year, we did better than the previous year.

Mission Giving (Channels 1, 3, 4, 5) \$189,268.49 Supplemental Giving \$53,535.04 Grand Total \$242,803.53

We have a large task ahead of us to meet the \$280,000 goal for Mission Giving. As more of our units meet in person, our mission giving will go up.

The past couple of years have moved many of us into new ways of doing our work. Some of you have become more interested in

electronic giving for your units. National United Women in Faith have brokered an agreement with Vanco to offer on-line giving for United Women in Faith Units with no monthly fee. (Card processing fees will still apply.) If you are interested in exploring this option for your unit, contact me at <a href="mailto:treasurerngcumw@gmail.com">treasurerngcumw@gmail.com</a>. ## **Preserving the Right to Vote**

United Women in Faith and the Bishops of the United Methodist Church are united in their continuing support of voter rights and fair access to vote in the US (United Methodist Women Resistance to Voter Suppression Still Necessary on the 50th Anniversary of the Votina Rights Act). On August 24, 2021, the US House of Representatives passed the John Lewis Voting Rights Acts, designed to restore and strengthen parts of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. On November 3, 2021 and again on January 19, 2022, the US Senate failed to pass versions of the Voting Rights Act.

If you are interested in passage of federal voting rights legislation or overturning Georgia restrictions on voter rights, you may wish to partner with one or more of these grassroots organizations working to preserve voter rights and fair elections. **ACLU** (Voting Rights | American Civil Liberties Union <u>aclu.org</u>) is actively engaged in promoting fair access to all Americans who want to cast a ballot in the US.

**Common Cause** (Common Cause - Fighting to Uphold the Values of American Democracy) provides up-to-date information on how you can help break down barriers to voter participation.

**Democracy Docket** (Democracy Docket) offers up to date information on voting, elections and redistricting sent straight to your inbox.

War is awful; an unjust war is a crime and we know that all wars affect the most vulnerable in any society: women, children and youth. Pray for a just end to all conflicts!

As your in-coming Education & Interpretation Coordinator for the North Georgia United Women in Faith, I have a long shadow to match, following the gifted and talented Janice Walker. I am at once humbled by the invitation and excited for the opportunity to serve in this capacity. As with all new tasks, I am on an up-hill learning curve; many of you have been in this role either in your local unit or in your District and likely know much more than I. I welcome your suggestions and our conversations.

In the two months since I have formally taken office, it has become apparent that the role of E&I offers a wonderful overview of UWF. The task of the E&I coordinator speaks to the heart of our Purpose: we, as community of women, give so that women, children and youth may share with us the joy of "knowing God and experiencing freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ." On a continuum as we learn how and where the dollars we contribute are used, we are able to discuss with enthusiasm and joy how our funds provide shelter, education, safety, job skills, and in general, a fuller life for the world's most vulnerable Children of God. In short, our role is a source of information, promotion and marketing for the work the UWF and our contributions provide.

As part of the introduction to this new role, I attended a Z00M learning session with National Staff which offered Chapter One of equipping us with tools to assist in our work. The most helpful, in my opinion, were succinct phrases which we can share with every UWF member / potential UWF member regardless of title or role in our organization.

- 1. Mission Giving is an Act of Faith. Yes, we have abundant tools including the re-designed Prayer Calendar, now known as the Daily Prayer Guide, our Program Book, Response Magazine, and information from the national office, uwfaith. org etc. But first we must acknowledge and believe that our contributions, large or small, are put to the use intended and stated to fulfill our Purpose. We cast our nets of dollars upon the sea of need with confidence that our gifts will multiply with those gifts of our sisters to ease pain and bring healing and hope. Alongside this belief and trust, we must remember that "Mission Giving dollars are funds that are undesignated, unrestricted and will be used to underwrite the total program of the UWF, from the local level through the district, conference to the national and international levels."
- 2. As we meet with our sisters in the UWF, regardless of where we are, we can remind them that our financial giving is a response to our faith. Reflect on your everyday life: we support what we believe in. We give to our local church because we love it and believe in its value in our lives, in the

- community and the world. We support our kids' /grandkids' efforts in Scouting or the booster clubs for their sports teams because we know the value they bring to the lives of the younger generation. Likewise, we give to United Methodist Women because we believe in our Purpose and the value our financial gifts bring to the lives of women, children and youth around the world. In response to our faith in God's sovereignty, the value of the entities we support, and the women, children and youth who are the beneficiaries, our gifts enable us to reach around the world to show the love of Jesus Christ.
- 3. In a nutshell, as E&I coordinators we help our UWF members
  Understand and interpret where the money goes and its
  impact. In other words, by using our abundant UWF resources
  we inform (educate and encourage) our sisters and promote
  financial support of what we fund. Each of us can design a
  strategy and opportunity to tell the UWF mission and faith
  stories as it suits our personalities and our audience but the
  message remains the same: Mission Giving is an Act of Faith.

As I write this, we are just a few weeks away from the Day of Giving, March 23, to support the UWF Legacy Endowment Fund. We are invited to attend a Live Facebook event at 10 a.m., that day to learn how our financial gifts are being used. ## Who Can We Be Together?

Building Communities of Hope and Joy

Join us this year, as we study Luke 13, as we find ourselves in a period of disruption and uncertainty. In the midst of a devastating pandemic, divisive political climate, unaddressed systemic racism, ecological crises and economic turmoil, we turn to the stories of Jesus that have anchored Christian communities for two millennia.

Our hope is that we will leave Mission u with a bigger and broader vision of the community Christ is calling us to be in times of loss, grief, and massive disruption. What would be possible if we tend to the needs of our communities in small yet radical ways, as Jesus did in Luke 13?


