Dear Sisters,

Our UWF breakfast was a wonderful affair, I wish all of you could have attended. Breakfast speaker, Christine Lever shared a great deal of information concerning the ministry of one of our national mission institutions, New Bethlehem Community Center (NBCC) in Augusta. I encourage vou to visit their website at https://www. nbccaugustaga1.com where you will discover their rich history of providing adult education and services for family, children, senior adults, and at-risk communities. Education & Interpretation Coordinator, Emily Grossman learned that NBCC has an annual Souper Bowl fundraiser, held on the Friday of Super Bowl weekend. Funds from this event are used for New Bethlehem's food pantry, community gardens and other programs aimed at engaging with at risk youth. Due to COVID, they have not held this event for more than two years. To that end, during breakfast, we collected donations in support of this valuable service to the community. UMCOR Update: Dr. Stephen Redmond, Director of the North Georgia Disaster Warehouse reported that 24 flood buckets and 300 hygiene kits were collected at annual conference. Additionally, UWF Treasurer, Susan Stroup received \$450 in donations. We know that these numbers are not fixed as donations and resources are expected to continue. Dr. Redmond wants us to know that he is extremely grateful to the United Women in Faith. Because of vour faithful and generous support, the warehouse currently has over 2,000 buckets in stock which is the most that they have ever had readily available. This however, does not mean that more are not needed; we are entering hurricane season so please continue your support.

Of immediate need is for groups to bring work teams to the warehouse to help with sorting and packing kits. There are over 1,000 buckets that still need to be packed. In addition to fully loaded cleaning kits/flood buckets, other items needed are: 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner

(no spray cleaner), 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent and, 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap.

Hygiene kits also need to be vetted and packed. Additional hygiene items needed are toenail or fingernail clipper (no emery boards or metal nail files) and sturdy 6 inch combs (no pocket combs or picks). You may check the UMCOR website for description of items for both the cleaning and hygiene kits at https://umcmission.org/umcor-relief-supplies/.

The North Georgia Conference Disaster Response Warehouse is located at Impact UMC in East Point, GA. Volunteers are urgently needed. To volunteer, please contact Dr. Stephen Redmond, redmond09@aol.com or text 678-428-7997.



Because We Believe — The Charter for Racial Justice

What do you know about the United Women of Faith (UWF) Charter for Racial Justice? If you are a little unsure, you are not alone. If you want to know what you have been missing, here is a link to the official charter: Racial Justice | United Women in Faith (uwfaith.org)

I had the privilege of attending a workshop at our recent UWF Assembly on the Charter for Racial Justice. At this workshop I learned that in 1952 our Women's Division RACIAL JUSTICE Important Moments of Racial Justice History in the United States and United Methodist Women

Take a moment to download and peruse the "<u>Racial Justice Time Line</u>". You'll see how our women have responded over and over. And some gaps where we can do better.

of the Christian Service adopted their **Charter of Racial Policies**. This was decades before the predecessor organizations to the United Methodist Church approved any policies on racial justice. This charter has been updated and approved multiple times since its original adoption.

Today, this charter begins with how it is founded on our Christian beliefs that, among other things, God is the Creator of all and racism is a rejection of the teachings of Jesus. The charter goes on to declare that our strength lies in racial and cultural diversity. The "Because we believe" section ends with the statement, "We commit ourselves as individuals and as a community to follow Jesus Christ in word and in deed, and to struggle for the rights and the self-determination of every person and group of persons."

In the workshop at Assembly we were asked to identify what work the North Georgia Conference UWF has already done to promote the goals of the Charter for Racial Justice, and what will be our next steps in living out the Charter. Yes, United Women of Faith is big on accountability.

positions of leadership at the Conference and District level. However, we recognized that we need to be doing more.

Some of the ideas we discussed included: 1) revitalizing our conference Committee on the Charter for Racial Justice, 2) making more use of our Language Coordinators for recruiting and staying connected with Korean- and Spanish-speaking women, 3) including songs and scriptures in languages other than English as part of our programs, and 4) hosting Bible studies and book discussions with a focus on racial justice.

The National UWF office and the Southeast Jurisdiction of UWF is committed to resourcing us as we continue to live into the Charter. Watch for more information on two book studies coming out later in 2022 on "So You Want to Talk About Race" and "White Fragility."

A Fable for Our Time: Once upon a time, say June 2022, in a land not too far away, like North Georgia, USA, a pastor was being appointed to another church and saying farewell to the members and neighbors of her congregation she had come to serve and love. The church began to collect a Love Offering as a parting gift; the United Methodist Men stepped up and contributed \$100. The wife of the UMM president who is also a member of United Women in Faith, suggested the unit also contribute to the Love Offering.

In this time, it came to pass, the president and vice-president of the unit were in another far away land, Turn-it-Up, Florida, when the suggestion appeared, like magic, on a telephone screen! The two leaders said, "as United Women in Faith, we give generously from our silken purses." But they wondered about using funds from the unit's silken purse for a church-wide Love Offering. The Purpose says UWFaith "support the global ministries of the church." But does a farewell gift from the unit's silken purse to a beloved pastor fit into the guidelines of the Purpose, they wondered.

After some time of thought and discussion, the leaders and others agreed that because members of UWFaith would likely contribute to the Love Offering as individuals and members of the church, it would be appropriate for the UWFaith unit to honor this pastor with a Gift to Missions instead. And so it was and it came to be.

Friends, this season, beginning with Mother's Day and ending about a month later with Father's Day, bookending graduations, farewells and weddings, is a busy and joyful gift-giving time. As you discuss mission giving with your leadership team, at the district level, at the unit level and even within your personal circle of celebrations, consider a Gift to Missions to the United Women in Faith. A small gift, when combined with many more similar gifts, will support and enhance the work of our organization. "Gifts to Mission are undesignated, unrestricted, and used to underwrite the total program of United Women in Faith at the local, district, conference, national and international levels." I will share some ways to fund-raise for Gift to Mission in future newsletter columns.

Another tangible way to put our dollars to work is to encourage our local units to participate in our Quarterly Emphasis gifts of support to the four National Mission Institutions in North Georgia. In the first quarter of this year gifts were directed to New Bethlehem Community Center in Augusta. Now during the second guarter, our emphasis for giving is directed to

Paine College, also in Augusta. Clark Atlanta University will be the recipient of our third quarter gifts and Murphy-Harpst, Cedartown, will round out the year by receiving our gifts in the fourth quarter.

Those who attended the UWFaith Breakfast during Annual Conference 2022 in Athens had the opportunity to meet representatives of our four National Mission Institutions (NMIs). Representing New Bethlehem Community Center were Ms. Sheridan Glaze and Ms. Christine Lever, executive director and Program Liaison & Community Sustainability Coordinator respectively. From Paine College were our liaison who is also campus pastor and assistant professor of religion Rev. Luther Felder, and college president Dr. Cheryl Evans Jones. Our liaison at Murphy-Harpst Children's Center, Rev. Scott Fuller, also with the Advancement and Stewardship Office, joined us.

Ms. Lever spoke to us about the work of NBCC, a 110 year old community-based non-profit and their plans for broadening their reach into the community by providing services such as computer literacy, GED preparation and re-entry skills to formerly incarcerated juveniles. Each of our NMIs brought brochures for us to share and familiarize ourselves with their respective organizations. These brochures will be available, while they last, at Mission U in July.
